CAN YOU BELIEVE THIS ONE! Our 'Margarita BOP' was dug up and stolen! Penstemon heterophyllus "Margarita BOP' is very popular with native plant gardeners because of its beautiful flowers and interesting story. First discovered as a seedling in the early 1980's on the property of Las Pilitas Nursery near Santa Margarita, it is a chance hybrid between two native Penstemon species - heterophyllus and laetus. It was growing at the bottom of the front porch, hence the name "BOP". Hopefully the thief has given our 'Margarita BOP' a good home. We will plant another soon.
