# **The Valley Carpenter Bee**



This is a male Valley Carpenter Bee (Xylocopa sonorina) similar to the one who was spotted in the Museum's Manzanitas recently. This is new for us. Have you ever seen one?

Carpenter bees are among the largest bees - up to 1" in length. They are called 'carpenter' bees because they excavate tunnels in wood to create nesting cavities for their young. The are found primarily in the southwestern part of the United States.



Male Valley Carpenter Bees are golden and fuzzy with green eyes. Females are black and shiny. Like most native bees, females are not aggressive, and will normally sting only when provoked, while males do not have stingers and tend to avoid humans. For that reason, and because they are busy with mating and territory duties, it is rare to see a male.
